Sonic wave is an execting new concert series heading for Bungay's Fisher Theatre on September 27.

This new initiative will bring an eclectic palette of musical experiences to rural Suffolk, and for many of the artists it will be their first time performing in East Anglia.

Behind it are Françoise Lamy and Graham Daniels of Suffolk-based artists Addictive TV. Designed to champion grassroots music, the series highlights artists who cross over folk, world, jazz, electronic and contemporary styles, featuring a dynamic mix of touring performers and local talent.

Lamy, creative producer, said:

doorstep all year round while nurturing the
grassroots music scene at the same time.
Sonic Wave is our way of widening music
offerings and helping keep rural Suffolk's
music scene strong."



When Sonic Wave comes to Bungay's Fisher Theatre, seats will be removed to transform the space into a vibey dancefloor to welcome Alex Etchart & Vientos, artists bringing the emotive harmonies of South American and British folklore into wild electronica, with forgotten tales of queer love and the latinx diaspora; with support from Norwich-based Irish singer-songwriter Emma O'Reilly, a unique talent on the rise who's voice is as powerful as her lyrics. Bungay Folk Festival is back for a second year on September 5-7 with more music, dance and workshops across the town.

BUNGAY FOLK FESTIVAL

Headlining the festival will be the amazing

Eliza Carthy, multi award winner and one of the most recognisable faces in British folk, who will be performing two concerts in the Fisher Theatre. Other performers include Mishra, Tamsin Elliot and Tarek Elazhary, The Wilswood Buoys, The King Driscolls plus Orchestra of Samples who will close the festival on Sunday evening at the Fisher. Blake Harrison will be bringing his African drums to the festival and offering a free drum workshop to both adults and youngsters, and Norwich based singer, Mary Lovett will be leading a free singing workshop. Mog and his renegade Irish drums make a second appearance, plus Mog is offering four workshops at various levels.

The lineup of bands is almost complete and much of the music is free to access, so please check out the programme at https://www.bungayfolkfestival.co.uk/ put the dates in your calendar and keep an eye out for more regular updates. Tickets for the evening events and workshops will be on sale from mid June.

In other news, we at BFF were up with the early birds at dawn on May 1st to witness the May Day celebrations on Broome Heath as Rumburgh Morris got into their stride amidst the ancient barrows, and on May Day Monday we were playing traditional English tunes at the Annis Hill Green and with Paul Gill leading the revellers in May Day songs.

On July 17th BFF are teaming up with their friends at Black Shuck to provide the lunchtime concert courtesy of Artistic Fields in St Marys Church, this is a free concert but donations are encouraged!

Meanwhile at the Green Dragon and Three Tuns, our folk tune and singaround sessions continue every month on the 2nd and 3rd Monday evenings from 7-10; why not come along and join in or just come to listen.

BLACK SHUCK

TESTIVAL 1st ~ 3rd August

Now in its 4th year - the **Black Shuck Festival is** back even bigger with more exciting events than before!

Outreach into our local schools will see children creating wonderful – and bloodthirsty – art and poems for the Festival and the popular art exhibition depicting all things folklore will be at the Bell Gallery.

The town centre will be buzzing - look out for a Shuck Trail, a historical walk and the start of the Parade. This will make its way along Bridge Street to Falcon Meadow for Saturday afternoon's Falcon Fair. There will be music, circus, and all sorts of shenanigans, including the ritualistic 'burning' of the Black Shuck effigy and the Demon Cards, where we write down our woes and banish them to the 'flames'.

But before this, on the Friday there is lots going on for families - craft workshops in St. Mary's, talks from Suffolk legend Charlie Haylock in the Fisher and – in the Fisher basement, youngsters can try out a brand new, and scary! video game based on Black Shuck. In the evening at the Fisher there will be a special performance of Sing-A-Long-A-Wickerman. Yes, you can dress up as your favourite spooky character and singalong to the film. Not terrifying at all.

Saturday morning, before the Parade, sees Rust & Stardust, a puppetry theatre company, presenting The Green Children of Woolpit at the Fisher and pianist extraordinaire William Fergusson will give a recital at St. Mary's.

A Straunge & Terrible Wunder is the Festival's flagship event in St. Mary's on the Saturday evening where an invited celebrity will



perform as the Reverend Abraham Fleming retelling the story of the terrible events on 4th August 1577 but before that the story will be told in words and music by children's author James Mayhew and local composer Roger Eno.

Shuck Sunday at Falcon Meadow will help us all kick back and relax with music, theatre, circus as well as activities in and on the river, tai chi, yoga and sound bath meditation, with plenty for families, children and, with medieval swordfighting that older children and young teens will love.

We are even laying on a minibus which will pick people up at the doctor's surgery and ferry them to Falcon Meadow. Especially for those who have no-one to go with, or who would prefer a lift to the meadow.

Meanwhile, in the Fisher Theatre the Norfolk Folklore Society are bringing a range of folklore experts with some exciting talks on folklore.

The day finishes with another specially written work with a massive choir from William Drew-Batty - Fire! Fire! It's about the Great Fire of Bungay and promises to be something special.

Bungay Heritage Open Days 2025: "Building Bungay"



ungay will mark this year's national **Heritage Open Days in September 2025** with a rich and engaging programme celebrating the town's architectural evolution, building materials, and historical turning points.

Spanning both weekends of the national festival, the programme will invite residents and visitors alike to explore how Bungay was shaped - brick by brick, beam by beam, and idea by idea.

Ups and Downs - Bungay's Architecture 13/14 September

Discover the vertical stories of Bungay—from its hidden cellars to its rooftop views. This will explore Bungay's use of water systems, subterranean spaces, and skyline changes over time. A particular highlight will be access to the historic cellar beneath the Three Tuns, brought to life with display boards and interpretive material.

Bungay's myths and their influence on architecture - Three Tuns Bungay, 13 Sep 2025 (Pre-booking required on the Fisher website)

Historic Building Myth busting-Uncovering Folklore, History and Archaeology in Bungay Go to any ancient building in Bungay and there will be interesting, exciting, and romantic stories presented to the visitor. James Wright will explain the development of such myths and investigate the underlying truths behind

"The Town in Time" - St Mary's Church Display 19-21 September

Hosted in the atmospheric St Mary's Church, this exhibition will trace the town's architectural journey from the 12th century to today

Bungay in Business

FuzzypegFolk has opened in Bungay with the hope of "bringing a smile to people's faces", and the lovely red painted building and colourful items inside certainly has that effect! Katharine Ricks, a Suffolk native and entrepreneur, has revived the name of her mum's original shop in Woodbridge and created a web-based mail order business, intending initially to sell from a decorative horse drawn wagon at festival pop-ups. Remembering Bungay from her childhood, she came across the vacant Buttercross shop and "as soon as I saw the shop I knew within one minute that this was where I wanted to be". Katharine grew up in a Maltese cultural environment and has always loved bold colours and folk art, particularly from Central and Eastern Europe, with an inspiration for timeless craft and materials and being as ethical as possible. In addition to her creative eye, Katharine learnt business skills working in fashion as a buyer for Jaeger and Armani stores and as Operations Director with Blue Sky Botanics managing the supply chains of many ethical and sustainable products.

StyleX is expanding and has moved into new premises in Chaucer Street after five years in Earsham Street, having previously been in Upper Olland Street for fifteen years. Nicky and Toni continue growing the business and now have more space to be able to

accommodate more stylists and customers. Having started initially in Harleston and Halesworth they each have built up a clientele from across the Waveney valley, particularly for bridal parties, with Nicky specialising in styling and Toni in colouring. They both relish their regular customers, many of whom have followed from salon to salon; as Nicky says, "the secret of styling is to know your client's hair".



BACT - Connecting People



Bact community transport based in Bungay since 1997, provides a lifeline to people in the Bungay area and beyond, enabling them to access a life outside of the home and maintain their independence. Trips provided include transport for medical appointments, shopping, socialising, accessing education, group outings, getting people to onward transport links and group outings. Whether we transport in a car, a wheelchair accessible vehicle or a minibus, we need more help with volunteers to drive our lovely passengers.

Bact community transport is currently overwhelmed with journey requests and is having to refuse trips as we just do not have enough volunteers. Since 2018, our volunteer drivers have halved in number, which has had an enormous impact on what we can do.

Could you help? – just one day a week (any day) can make a dramatic difference to someone. Plus, it is a rewarding role, all our volunteers gain the feel-good factor knowing they are helping others!

Bungay Country Market, if you have not already heard of it, is a small co-operative consisting of local producers who have been offering their goods for sale in the town for over 30 years. We moved to the new Community Centre when it opened and are there every Thursday morning from 9.00 am until 10.30 am in the Evans Room.

Every week we can offer homemade baked sweet and savoury items, jams and preserves including our popular marmalade alongside fresh hen and duck eggs from a producer's local smallholding. When in season, we also sell home grown fruit and vegetables, and flowers. Local honey is available at a very reasonable price compared with other outlets. Currently it is £6.50 per 454g (1 lb) jar. Our cooks can fulfil any orders taken for delivery the following week and are happy to do so. For your information we all holders of Food Hygiene Certificates and declare all ingredients and allergens as required by law.

Why not come and see what we have to offer. We are sure that you will be surprised at the choice available but come early for a better selection of goodies. We look forward to seeing you soon.

The Bungay Town Trust **Almshouses**



Imshouses in the UK date back over 1000 years, providing affordable housing and support for the needy, particularly older residents. They are owned and maintained by almshouse charities, with residents paying a modest weekly maintenance contribution while covering their own utilities and insurance.

The Bungay Town Trust, a registered charity, manages thirteen one-bedroom groundfloor apartments for retirees. Eight units, known as St Edmunds Homes, are located on Outney Road. Built in 1895 by local solicitor and former Town Reeve

Frederick Smith, these Tudorstyle homes were extended and modernised in 2014. The building now holds Grade II status and is set within landscaped gardens.

The remaining five units, called Jubilee Homes, were built in 1970 in Staithe Close and also feature modern upgrades and private gardens.

All properties are currently occupied, but applications are welcome from eligible individuals.
